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The 60th AGM was held in the Thomas Clarkson Centre, Bury St Edmunds on Wednesday 17th May 2023 at 7pm.

Apologies for Absence: Revd Professor Sir D MacCulloch, Dr N Karn, Dr J Fiske, Dr K Jewell, Dr D Allen and Dr K Briggs (Council) and 50 members of the Society.

The Chairman, Dr Harvey Osborne welcomed everyone to the meeting and thanked the Council members and the officers of the Society for all their hard work during the previous year. In April Robert [Bob] Malster had died a few days after his 91st birthday, He was elected to Council in December 1999 and had also edited volume 56 in 2013 *The Minute Books of the Suffolk Humane Society.* His background was in journalism and he was a fine historian with interests in the fishing industry, industrial Ipswich and maritime history. An excellent online obituary had appeared in the Eastern Daily Press. His funeral will be held at Holbrook church on Friday 26th May at 2.30pm.

1519 Minutes of the 59th Annual General Meeting (previously circulated)

The minutes of the 59th AGM held in Monks Eleigh on 26th May 2022 were signed by the Chairman. All in favour.

1520 Trustees' Annual Report for the year 2022-2023

The Annual report had been presented. Proposed by Tanya Christian and seconded by Charles Farrow. All in favour.

1521 Financial Report

The Treasurer presented the annual accounts for the year 2022-2023. He was pleased with the return on the investments of 4%. Their level was set at medium risk. Although the Society had made a small surplus of £465, the value of investments had gone down by £7000. Royalties had also increased. There was very little change to the Charters Series accounts since they had no investments. The adoption of the accounts was proposed by Richard Smith and seconded by Mrs Christian. All in favour.

1522 Future volumes

Mr Sherlock paid tribute to Dr Joanne Sear and Dr James Davis for producing such a magnificent volume on the Records of Medieval Newmarket. It had been the easiest volume he had ever had to co-ordinate. In 2024 we would meet near the coast for a volume about the 1953 Floods based on the note books of John Trist. This would be the latest book by date the Society had ever produced. Mr Sherlock was thanked by Dr Osborne for continuing to oversee the production of fine academic volumes for the Society.

1523 Charters Series

Dr Karn sent a report stating that Francis Young's volume on the Franciscans in Bury St Edmunds would be ready to be launched at the end of the year. Mrs Vivien Brown has completed the Index to the Bury Town Charters and the Society hoped to publish this in two volumes in 2024 and 2025.

1524 Election of Chairman

Dr Osborne vacated the chair and he was proposed by Mr Sherlock and seconded by Mr David Addy. All in favour.

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1525 Election of Officers

The election of officers en bloc was proposed by Dr Joanne Sear, seconded by Mr John Saunders. All in favour.

1526 Election of Council members

The election of 7 current Council members was proposed en bloc by Mr Paul Botwright and seconded by Ms Denise Parkinson. All in favour.

1527 Election of co-opted Council members

The election of Dr Joanne Sear and Dr John Greenacre who were co-opted earlier in 2023 as a Council members, was proposed by Mr Charles Farrow and seconded by Mr Martyn Taylor. All in favour.

1528 Election of Independent Examiner

Mrs Rosemary Unthank was proposed as Independent Examiner by Mr C Mees and seconded by Mr David Addy. All in favour.

1529 Volume 66: Records of Medieval Newmarket: Manor Court Rolls 1399-1413 and Manor Account Rolls 1403/4-1482/3. Professor Richard Smith, President of the Society, introduced Dr James Davis, Queens University, Belfast and Dr Joanne Sear, University of Cambridge, the joint editors of the volume. Afterwards he co-ordinated questions from the floor and then thanked both editors for producing such an excellent and interesting volume which would receive plaudits from far and wide.

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TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2023/24

- 1. Trustees and Council members for the year were Dr Harvey Osborne (Chairman), Professor Richard Smith (President), Mrs Vivienne Aldous, Mrs Claire Barker (Secretary), Dr Keith Briggs (SIAH representative), Ms Kate Chantry [Suffolk Archives], Mrs Tanya Christian (Membership Secretary & Webmaster), Mr Charles Farrow (NRS representative), Dr Jane Fiske, Dr John Greenacre, Dr Kate Jewell, Dr Nicholas Karn (Charters Series Editor), Revd Professor Sir Diarmaid MacCulloch, Mr Clive Mees (Treasurer), Dr Joanne Sear, Mr David Sherlock (Co-ordinating Editor). Mr Clive Paine, Mr Robert Malster [†May 2023], Dr David Allen, Mrs Marion Allen and Mrs Vivien Brown served as Vice-Presidents. Council consisted of six Honorary Officers and eight elected members.
- 2. The 2023 AGM was held at The Thomas Clarkson Centre, Bury St Edmunds where Volume 66 Records of Medieval Newmarket: Manor Court Rolls 1399-1413 and Manor Account Rolls 1403/4-1482/3 was introduced by the editors, James David and Joanne Sear.
- 3. **MEMBERSHIP:** As of 11th January 2024 we had 290 members: 57 institutions and 233 individual members, with only 1 Life Member left. 2023 saw another drop in membership numbers but we are continuing to have new ones joining via the website regularly, often from outside the county. However, many of these do not retain their membership past the first year.
- 4. **FINANCE:** This has been a year of stability for the SRS accounts with no significant changes throughout the year. The surplus for the year is £654 (+41%). Income from subscriptions is showing a downward trajectory, but other income is in line with previous years. The production of volume 66 *Records of Medieval Newmarket* shows expenditure of £5293. It is pleasing to note the increase in valuation of our investments (0.08%). Charters Series: No change of note from the previous year.
- 5, **GENERAL SERIES**: The SRS will publish Volume 67 *The Great Sea Floods of 1953, The Records of P.J.O. Trist,* edited by Denise Parkinson in May 2024.
- 6. **CHARTERS SERIES**: Volume XXII in this series *The Franciscans in Medieval Bury St Edmunds* was launched with a lecture given by the editor, Dr Francis Young, at a very successful event organised by Moyses' Hall Museum in Bury St Edmunds. It is hoped that Volume XXIII *The Bury St Edmunds Town Charters* will be published soon, probably in two parts.
- 7. **WEBSITE:** The website is doing well with 81 orders (123 separate items) being sold in 2023. 7 more out of print volumes were digitised at the end of 2023 making the total number of digitised volumes on the site 26. We have also added to the Digital Material with a submission by John Pelling of *The Diary of John Clopton*. The second phase of the Suffolk History Hub appears to be on hold and may never be fulfilled as SIAH are now publishing digital material on their own website.
- 8. The Society will hold the 61st AGM in Orford Town Hall on May 23rd 2024, when volume 67 will be launched.

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INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE SUFFOLK RECORDS SOCIETY

I report on the Accounts of the Society for the year ended 30th September 2023

Respective Responsibilities of the Trustees and the Examiner.

The Charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (the Charities Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

It is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the Charities Act
- to follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commission (under section 145(5)(b) of the Charities Act), and
- to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of the Independent Examiner's Statement

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts with those records.

It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair' view and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.

Independent examiner's statement

In connection with my examination, no matter has come to my attention:

- (1) which gives me reasonable cause to believe that, in any material respect, the requirements:
 - to keep proper accounting records in accordance with section 130 of the Charities Act; and
 - to prepare accounts which accord with the accounting records and comply with the requirements of the Charities Act
